Pastoral Letter December 2020

Merry Christmas

"While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." (Luke 2:6,7)

Now, as it's coming up to Christmas and we're sure that everyone "likes" Christmas crackers and those awful jokes we usually get inside them... how about a question that may get us thinking as part of our cracker this time round?

Who was present at both Jesus' birth and his death?

Some of you will get the answer quickly - others may have to think a bit.

John 19:25 may give you some assistance: *"Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother..."*

The reason for asking the question is that in the reformed tradition we often do not seem to pay as much attention as, say, the Catholic church, to Mary, the mother of Jesus. Perhaps there is still something deep within us that, when we mention Mary, we are fearful that we may be thought of as someone that has wandered away from the true path - it's all about Jesus, don't you know, not Mary?

But can we not learn from Mary, as we learn from many others who are mentioned in our Bibles, and as we learn from others mentioned in Church history?

Have you ever considered what it must have been like to have had Mary's life?

From having an angel appear and announce to her when she was still a young child that she was going to give birth to the Christ-child, to watching over him as he grew up, to not understanding why he would want to stay in the temple and learn when he was still a boy. Then there were occasions when Jesus was teaching when it felt as if you were not wanted or needed... and we forgot to mention her encouragement to him to perform his first gospel-recorded miracle - turning water into wine at Cana.

For your child to then be hung on a cross while you watched - from near, or from afar?

What a journey Mary was on.

And it doesn't end there.

We discover that Mary too was present with those early disciples, praying with them as they waited for the day the Spirit was to come (Acts 2:14). Was she among the disciples when the Spirit was poured out? How did she feel, surrounded by people who walked with Jesus, her son, when in their prayers, in her prayers, they spoke to the God who Jesus called his Father?

As you look again at the Christmas pictures in this strange year, look again at Mary, the carrier of the Christ-child, and see if you might find new inspiration to carry Christ yourself into the year ahead - a year we all hope will bring change for the better.





3rd Enfield Boys' Brigade at 130

This year marks the 130th anniversary of the 3rd Enfield Boys' Brigade Company. The 1st Enfield Company, based in the Lancaster Road area, was only formed two years before the 3rd Enfield. Over the 130 years the two Companies have become famous as great rivals and friends, both at the local BB and London District BB levels. At the time of their formation Enfield was undergoing a transition from a country town to suburb of London. The 3rd Enfield was formed by Mr Norris Storer Toms and they held their first meeting on 3rd December 1890. In the first session 33 boys enrolled into the Company. In the early days there was a negative atmosphere towards the Boys' Brigade Companies. Few drill nights went by without attacks from hooligans and the trouble-makers, even Officers in uniform were pelted with bottles and other missiles as they went to drill and the boys had to defend their uniforms often with their fists. Despite the difficulties the Company survived. The Company was registered on 29th January 1891. Legend has it that the man from the 3rd Enfield rushed up to London to register the Company on the same day as the 2nd Enfield. The man from the 2nd Enfield caught the train and the one from the 3rd Enfield missed the train.

In 1892 a significant event happened with the appointment of Thomas Room Plowman as Captain of the Company at the age of 16. He began to change the Company, improving it in all areas. He shaped the 3rd Enfield into one of the successful Companies in the Brigade. The Company colour became red and the famous red ties were introduced. They were commonly used on significant events such as the annual Whit-Monday inspection parade and sports at the local Enfield Town Park, large crowds of Enfield residents would attend the event. This athletic sports competition was started in 1893 and was won by the 3rd Enfield. The trophy is still contested today and is probably one of the oldest trophies currently in use in the BB. A drum and fife band was started in 1894, which

changed to a bugle band in 1914. The Company held its first camp at Burnham-on-Crouch in 1893 and the first camp under canvas was 1900 in Lowestoft. In 1897 Sir William Alexander Smith, founder of The Boys' Brigade, visited the three Enfield BB Companies, known at that time as the United Enfield Companies, before the Enfield Battalion was formed. Mr Smith spoke at a united Bible class and then in the evening he attended a lantern service for 220 boys. Throughout the visit the 3rd Enfield provided a drum and fife band and gave a display of sword drill exercises.

Captain Plowman was able to shape the 3rd Enfield into a tour de force in the discipline of drill. They won the London District Drill competition, the Meares Colours, in 1905. The following year the 3rd Enfield became the very first Company at the Royal Albert Hall Display to win the new competition for overall proficiency, namely the Daily Telegraph Shield competition. The following year the Company won the Daily Telegraph Shield again, this time Major-General Robert Baden-Powell presented the trophy, only months before running his famous Brownsea Island experiment, which led to the formation of the Scouting movement. Between 1906 and 1920 the 3rd Enfield won the Daily Telegraph Shield no less than seven times and appeared in nearly every final. In 1914 the Company was in the final with the 62nd London Company at the Royal Albert Hall Display. A few days later the BB founder passed away suddenly. The Company provided a guard of honour at Sir William Smith's funeral in London. Mr Alfred L Winsley, a Lieutenant in the 3rd,



was one of the pall-bearers at the funeral.

During the First World War, the 3rd with the 1st Enfield provided "All-clear" Zeppelin air raid buglers to help sound the signal to Enfield residents that they were now safe. When I interviewed old boys of the 3rd Enfield in 1983 and 1984, who were teenagers during the First World War, they would recall the effects of the 1918-1919 Spanish Flu pandemic in Enfield, their words do resonate with the current COVID-19 pandemic that we are now living through.

Captain Plowman enlisted to fight in the First World War and was wounded in France, although he survived the War, his injuries and the War had taken their toll on his health, he passed away suddenly on 1st January 1920. Earlier this year we marked the centenary of his passing. The Company didn't recover for years, they missed their great Captain and they lost their dominance in drill. But by the time of their Golden Jubilee in 1940, the 3rd recovered their excellence in drill once again, winning the Daily Telegraph Shield again in their special anniversary year. The founder's son, Captain G Stanley Smith, joined the 3rd for their golden celebrations at their headquarters. The 3rd repeated the Daily Telegraph Shield win in 1943, the Diamond Jubilee year of The Boys' Brigade. At the 1943 Windsor Castle Royal Review with King George VI, the King asked one of the 3rd Enfield boys why they were wearing a red tie.

In the 1950s the Company found success in the field of bugle band work. They won the Devonshire Cup for Bugle Bands at the 1956 Royal Albert Hall Display, receiving the trophy from Sir Roger Bannister, the first man to run the mile under four minutes. In 1957 they achieved the first ever encore at the BB Royal Albert Hall Display, it was the playing of their own bugle piece, Swingtime, which had the audience cheering. The band went on to play at several BB events throughout the post-war years, including the stage show called London Town in 1959. The Band-on-the Beat item was repeated at the 1964 Royal

Albert Hall Display, and variation of the item called Bandagogo appeared at the display in 1969.

In 1966, the Company lost their most loyal Officer with the passing of Charles Chopping; he had been with the Company for 72 years, holding every post. In the 1970s and 1980s the 3rd Enfield had continued successful in the field of bugle band work. During this era they won the Devonshire Cup four times (1972, 1978, 1979, and 1982), the bugle team four times and the solo bugler twice. In 1972 they appeared on TV playing at the Football League Cup final at Wembley. They won the very last Devonshire Cup final held at the BB Royal Albert Hall Display in 1982. The Company also won the London District Two Section Drill trophy ten times. For four years in a row, during the 1980s, they won the Daily Telegraph Shield with the 1st Enfield. In 1985 the Company provided the guard of honour for the unveiling of the Sir William Smith plaque in the St Paul's Cathedral vaults. The BB in Enfield celebrated its centenary in 1988, and in 1990 the 3rd Enfield reached their 100th anniversary. The Brigade President at the time, Lord Thurso, joined the centennial celebrations in December 1990. A special parade Church service was held in front the Brigade President, when new Company colours were presented. At the service to dedicate the new Company colours was Revd Geoffrey Plowman, a relative of Captain Thomas Plowman.

In the 1990s the Company notched up notable cricket and athletic success. They also returned to form with their bugle band work, winning the London District drum team and solo bugler titles. In recent years the boys have taken part in camps, weekends away, theme park trips and activity days either on our own or with others from Enfield Battalion and London District. The Company also runs a combined bugle band with our friends from the 1st Enfield BB/Amicus and won the London District Devonshire Cup in 2006 and 2008, as well as the Novice Band competition in 2014.

In the last few years, the Company has been very active in

competitions, especially sporting ones, having achieved victories in competitions for football, table tennis, bowling, swimming, badminton, amongst others.



The 3rd Enfield Company has gone from strength to strength over the past 130 years, and even in this testing year of the pandemic, the Company has found the determination to find a way forward through these challenging times. A big thank you to the leaders and helpers of the Company for their dedicated work and the many hours of their time they put in. Here's to the next 130 years for the good old "3rd".

Thames North Synod news

New Moderator of URC's Thames North Synod nominated

The Revd George Watt, Minister of Reigate Park United Reformed Church (URC), has been nominated as the next Moderator of the Church's Thames North Synod.



George was born and brought up in the Highlands of Scotland, living most of his childhood in the village of Lairg in Sutherland.

He came to faith through the work of Scripture Union and was also nurtured through his local Church of Scotland and its youth fellowship.

George's family moved to the Shetland Islands when he started studying at Stirling University where he gained a degree in history, but also studied economics, statistics and religious studies.

On graduating, the minister moved to the Medway Towns in Kent where he started work as a statistician with Lloyds of London. He went on to become a computer implementation analyst.

George joined the URC in Gillingham and became an Elder at the age of 23. He met and married his wife Linda and then started training for the ministry at Mansfield College.

His first pastorate was at Freemantle and Isaac Watts Memorial Churches in Southampton. In 1998, he moved to St Andrew's, Cheam where he was minister for 12 years. George has been the Minister at Reigate Park Church in Surrey for the

past ten years.

George and Linda have three sons: Nathan, married to Emily, who works as a BT consultant; Jacob who is studying medicine at the University of Aberdeen, and Reuben who is studying ethical hacking at Coventry University and is currently the URC Youth Moderator.

He has particularly enjoyed being involved in local schools as a governor and leading collective worship. Recently, he provided moderatorial cover in the URC's Southern Synod and serves as Synod Council Convener.

In his spare time George enjoys cooking, gardening and walking.

Speaking of his nomination, George said: "I am really looking forward to working with and supporting the churches and ministers of the Thames North Synod. I am excited by the diverse nature of the Synod and all the richness that entails. In these challenging times I hope to be able to encourage the Synod in its witness and mission."

George succeeds the role after the Revd Dr Andrew Prasad announced his retirement. Dr Prasad is due to retire in early 2021, having served as Synod Moderator since 2008.

The nomination will now be presented to Mission Council.

The Revd Dr John Bradbury, URC General Secretary, says: "George brings a wealth of experience of ministry, including having held some of the responsibilities of Moderator previously. He impressed the panel with his vision for the life of the United Reformed Church and his pastoral skills."

Note: Following publication of this article, Mission Council appointed Revd George Watt as Moderator of the Thames North Synod from 1st June 2021 until 31st May 2028.
