MINISTERS LETTER

Dear Friends,

Some time ago I read a story of two beached whales which were in distress. Rescuers had tried without success to push them back into the sea. It looked as though they would have to be put down. Then Moko, a bottled-nose dolphin appeared. In an incident that amazed conservationists, the dolphin, apparently responding to the whales' distress calls, led them to safety.

The pygmy sperm whales, a mother and a male calf, had become stranded in Mahia Beach about three hundred miles north east of Wellington, New Zealand. A local man, who found them, alerted his neighbour, a conservation worker, and they spent an hour and a half trying to re-float the whales, only to see them beached repeatedly on a large sand-bar just offshore. It was presumed that the whales were disorientated and could not find their way back, past the sand-bar, to the sea.

It was considered that killing the whales would be the most humane thing to do to save them from a slow painful death. At that point, Moko, as local people have named the dolphin, arrived. Moko, who often plays with humans at Mahia, approached the whales and guided them two hundred yards along the shoreline and out through a channel into the open sea.

Witnesses said that Moko and the whales could be heard making noises to each other. The whales were emitting whistles and clicks which were probably distress signals. However, it is unusual for a dolphin to communicate with pygmy sperm whales. But something happened that enabled Moko to guide the two whales to safety. Moko returned to the beach soon afterwards and resumed her water games with locals.

The dolphin's action is evidence of the species' friendly altruistic nature. Experts have said that dolphins have a great capacity for altruistic activities. They have been known to protect people lost at sea, as well as being playful.

I think this is a wonderful story and that we can learn much from one of God's creatures. The dictionary defines altruism as "regard for, and devotion to, the interest of others".

Jesus commands us to "Love your neighbour as you love yourself" and told the Parable of the Good Samaritan to illustrate his commandment. The Good Samaritan's actions went beyond the boundaries of race, religion and nationality. He helped an injured man, without thought for himself and went the extra mile (Luke 10:25-37).

The story of the dolphin stirs the heart and makes us think. We can marvel at an animal showing such qualities. But most important of all we have the inspiring example of the Good Samaritan and the magnanimous life of Jesus to guide us.

It is good that a dolphin has been described as altruistic, we should endeavour to be altruistic too.

May the love and peace of God be with you all, David.

Sabella florist design in London Road.







And Another Thing......

As I listened to the sermon on Sunday, 13th September on the subject of 'WISDOM', a little thought came to mind as to who can claim to be the wisest man to have ever walked the earth (I'm not counting Jesus, as He is the Son of God).

Usually, if asked, most people would probably say Solomon. No one ever says, "As wise as David or John or Peter or Mary.......". Everyone automatically says, "As wise as Solomon". The Queen of Sheba certainly thought so and journeyed a great distance for an audience with him. We are told she left, marvelling at his wisdom. Yet, was he the wisest man in history?

Solomon, certainly started his kingship on a right note. When granted a wish by God, he chose to ask for wisdom to carry out his duties as king and on a personal note, wisdom to discern between good and bad. He didn't choose fame or riches and we read in the bible that his choice pleased God and God blessed him by not only giving him wisdom but also fame and riches.

WHAT: Pilots are a group for boys and girls aged five upwards. They meet for games, drama, craft activities and fun, based on a bible theme.


