Pastoral Letter December 2025 & January 2026

Hello,

Firstly, I would like to take the opportunity to thank our magazine editors for all they have done for us through 2025. I would like to wish them all, on everyone's behalf, a very Happy Christmas and blessed New Year and especially a well-deserved rest for a month, as this is the bumper December & January edition.

Looking back over the year, so much has been achieved by our three churches. There have been highs and lows but that's life, isn't it? We have had to said goodbye to a few good friends from all three churches and communities, which has brought us times of sorrow. We pray that their loved ones will find some comfort in this first Christmas without them. However, there have been so many good things that have happened and have been achieved during 2025 too.

I was joking with someone that I am already thinking about well into next year; Good Friday has already been mentioned! Planning ahead of time and time management is essential in this role so that when the unexpected happens, there is a bit of give to be flexible. Church Meeting


Our next Church Meeting will take place on Sunday 18 January following the morning service. All members are encouraged to attend where possible as we discuss important church matters.

Communion offerings

The December Communion offering (taken at the service on Sunday 7 December) is for the Bible Society.

The Bible Society believes that the Bible is God's gift to the world. They want everyone to discover its message for themselves and because of that they translate the Bible and make it accessible in

people's own languages. They also bring the Bible into public spaces where its voice can be heard, for instance through the National Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast or The Pitch film fund. They tell its stories, for instance through the Open the Book programme with primary-age children. They encourage people who've never thought the Bible was for them to explore it for themselves, and see life through a different lens.



As part of United Bible Societies, the Bible Society is now active in around 240 countries and regions. Through their translation work, they make the Bible available in new spoken and signed languages, as well as revising existing Bibles to bring the language up-to-date.

To meet the individual needs and demands of the millions wanting the Scriptures, their production facilities not only print physical copies but also produce visual, audio and digital forms. Their distribution network takes the Bible to places it might otherwise be hard to come by, and they improve literacy by empowering people to read, using the book as a reference.

The Communion offering for January (taken at the service on Sunday 4 January) is for the Communion Fund. The Communion Fund is distributable at the discretion of the Minister to assist those in need.

A collection plate will be at the back of the church at the end of each service, and any donations will be gratefully received.

Christmas at Christ Church

We will be holding a range of services and other activities as we once again celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

On Saturday 13 December (10:00am-5:00pm) and Sunday 14 December (10:00am-4:00pm) the church will be open for our Christmas Tree Festival, which the BB & Girlguiding groups are organising. Local charitable organisations are being invited to decorate a Christmas tree with all of these being viewable throughout the weekend.

Refreshments will be available throughout - if you can help with these for any amount of time, please speak to Ruth or an Elder. Visitors will be able to vote for the best tree, which will win a small prize.

At 3:00pm on the Saturday there will be a Carol Concert, and at 10:45am on the Sunday our morning service will be our Christmas Nativity Celebration Service, led by The Worship Group.

At the Christmas Nativity, we invite you to bring gifts of non-perishable food, which will be given to Lancaster Road URC's Food Hub. The loose collection on this day will be given to Crisis and their Christmas Appeal.

On Monday 15 December at 2:15pm the Friendship Club will meet for

a Christmas programme, which will be led by Ruth and will include a bring and share tea.

On Sunday 21 December at 10:45am our Service of Lessons and Carols will be led by Ruth. Please note that the Christmas lunch afterwards will now not be taking place as was indicated in the last newsletter; rather we will look to hold a celebratory lunch in the early part of 2026 when kitchen refurbishments in the hall are complete. Also on Sunday 21 December, at 5:00pm-6:30pm, Chase Family Church will be holding a Carols by Candlelight Service in our church, to which our church family is warmly invited. Enfield Choral Society Concert

On Saturday 8 November, Enfield Choral Society helped Christ Church celebrate our 150th anniversary. It was wonderful to see the church full and the building coming into its own showing off its acoustics.

The evening's programme started with Charles Parry's 'I Was Glad' which was written originally for King Edward VII's coronation in 1901. This was followed by three pieces by Anton Bruckner.

We were honoured to have a premier performance of Roderick Elmer's setting of Psalm 46. This was a choral movement for choir and organ. Roddy has sung with ECS for over 30 years with six of his works premiered by the choir.

After the interval, which was provided by a team from Christ Church, the audience were invited to stand for the 'Hallelujah Chorus' by George F Handel. This chorus is the 'triumphant conclusion' of Handel's 'Messiah'.

The ECS Chamber Choir continued the concert with John Tavener's 'The Lamb', a choral setting which takes its text from William Blake. Then came Antonio Vivaldi's 'Gloria in D' which filled the church with its wonderful melodies; you could not help but feel uplifted. The performance concluded with John Rutter's 'A Gaelic Blessing', a perfect end to an incredible evening of sacred music.

The choir's musical director is Mark Sproson, the guest trumpeter was Alan Duguid and guest organist was Jonathan Dods.



150th Anniversary Service

The Adoration of the Kings

Matthew 2:1-12

Pieter Bruegel the Elder (c. 1525/1530-1569) was a Flemish artist from Antwerp in the Spanish Netherlands and became a master in the Guild there in 1551. He travelled in France and Italy and some of his compositions show the influence of Italian Mannerist art. From 1553 he painted scenes of daily life and religious subjects, influenced by the satirical style of Hieronymous Bosch. Bruegel's sons Pieter the Younger and Jan were also artists.

Bruegel's religious paintings, including *The Adoration of the Kings* painted in oil on an oak panel in 1564, were intended for connoisseurs rather than churches. It has never been proved whether he was a Roman Catholic, Protestant Calvinist or free thinker. He may have supported tolerance and freedom of belief at a time when many people held strong, even extreme, religious views.

Many of the figures in this painting are grotesque, rather than idealised, perhaps to emphasise the wonder of the birth of Christ. Mary is at the centre of *The Adoration of the Kings*. Her face is partly hidden by a blue cloak. She is holding the baby Jesus, whose blanket looks like a shroud, foretelling his death. He is shrinking from the wizened old king who is presenting a gift of gold-red grains of myrrh, which was used as an ointment and perfume. This gift alludes to Jesus' future death and burial. Another elderly king on the left seems overcome by his long journey, as he offers an ornate gold cup with cover. The third black king on the right is dressed in white. His

expensive gift is frankincense, a perfume derived from an aromatic gum resin which was used in burial ceremonies. The frankincense is contained in a small bottle balanced on a monkey in a gold model of a ship.

One of the bystanders in the background is whispering in Joseph's ear, perhaps to ask him what is happening. Other figures pressing forward to see what is going on include soldiers carrying weapons, two of which are topped with crosses symbolical of Jesus' manner of dying.

This painting may be seen in the National Gallery in London.

135th anniversary of the 3rd Enfield Boys' Brigade


3 December 2025 marks the 135th anniversary of the 3rd Enfield Boys' Brigade Company. The 1st Enfield was only formed two years before the 3rd Enfield; over the 135 years the two Companies have become famous as great rivals and friends, both at the local BB and London District BB levels. The headquarters of both Companies are

geographically close together.

At the time of their formation Enfield was undergoing a transition from a country town to suburb of London. The 3rd Enfield Company was formed by Mr Norris Storer Toms, second son of the Christ Church Minister, and they held their first meeting on 3 December 1890. In the first

session 33 boys enrolled into the Company. In the early days there was a negative atmosphere towards the Companies, however despite these difficulties the 3rd Enfield survived. The Company was registered on 29 January 1891. Legend has it that the man from the 3rd Enfield rushed up to London to register the Company on the same day as the 2nd Enfield. The man from the 2nd Enfield caught the train and the one from the 3rd Enfield missed it.

In 1892 a significant event happened with the appointment of Thomas Room Plowman as Captain of the Company at the age of 16. He began to change the Company, improving it in all areas. He shaped the 3rd Enfield into one of the successful Companies in the Brigade. The Company colour became red and the famous red ties were introduced. They were commonly used on significant events such as the annual Whit Monday inspection parade and sports at the local Enfield Town Park. This athletic sports competition was started in 1893 and was won by the 3rd Enfield.

A drum and fife band was started in 1894, which changed to a bugle band in 1914. The Company first held its first camp at Burnham-on-Crouch in 1893 and the first camp under canvas was 1900 in Lowestoft. In 1897 Sir William Alexander Smith, Founder of The Boys' Brigade, visited the three Enfield BB Companies, known at that time as the United Enfield Companies, before the Enfield Battalion was formed. Mr Smith spoke at a united Bible class and then in the evening he attended a lantern service for 220 boys. Throughout the visit the 3rd Enfield provided a drum and fife band and gave a display of sword drill exercises.

Captain Plowman was able to shape the 3rd Enfield into a tour de force in the discipline of drill. They won the London District Drill competition, the Meares Colours, in 1905. The following year the 3rd Enfield became the very first Company at the Royal Albert Hall Display to win the new competition for overall proficiency, namely the Daily Telegraph Shield competition. The following year the Company won the Daily Telegraph Shield again, this time Major-General Robert Baden-Powell presented the trophy, only months before running his famous Brownsea Island experiment, which led to the formation of the Scouting movement - and the rest is history.

Between 1906 and 1920 the 3rd Enfield won the Daily Telegraph Shield no less than seven times and appeared in nearly every

final. In 1914 the Company was in the final with the 62nd London Company at the Royal Albert Hall Display. A few days later the BB Founder passed away suddenly. The Company provided a guard of honour at Sir William Smith's funeral in London. Mr Alfred L Winsley, a Lieutenant in the 3rd, was one of the pallbearers at the funeral.

During the First World War, the 3rd with the 1st Enfield provided 'All Clear' Zeppelin air raid buglers to help sound the signal to Enfield residents that they were now safe. Captain Plowman enlisted to fight in the First World War and was wounded in France; although he survived the War, his injuries and the War had taken their toll on his health, he passed away suddenly on 1 January 1920. The Company never recovered for years, they missed their great Captain and they lost their dominance in drill. But by the time of their Golden Jubilee in 1940, the 3rd recovered their excellence in drill once again, winning the Daily Telegraph Shield again in their special anniversary year. The Founder's son, Captain G Stanley Smith, joined the 3rd for their golden celebrations at their church headquarters. The 3rd repeated the Daily Telegraph Shield win in 1943, the Diamond Jubilee year of The Boys' Brigade. At the 1943 Windsor Castle Royal Review with King George VI, the King asked one of the 3rd Enfield boys why they were wearing a red tie.

In the 1950s the Company found success in the field of bugle band work. They won the Devonshire Cup for Bugle Bands for the first time at the 1956 Royal Albert Hall Display, receiving the trophy from the famous runner Sir Roger Bannister. In 1957 they achieved the first ever encore at the BB Royal Albert Hall display, it was the playing of their own bugle piece, 'Swingtime', which had the audience cheering. In

1966, the Company lost their loyalist Officer with the passing of Charles Chopping; he had been with the Company for 72 years, holding every post.

In the 1970s and 1980s the 3rd Enfield had continued success in the field of bugle band and drill work. During this era, they won the Devonshire Cup a further four times (1972, 1978, 1979 and 1982), the Bugle Team four times and the Solo Bugler twice. In 1972 they appeared on TV playing at the Football League Cup final at Wembley. They won the very last Devonshire Cup final held at the BB Royal Albert Hall Display in 1982. The Company also won the London District Two Section Drill trophy ten times. For four years in a row, during the 1980s, they won the Daily Telegraph Shield with the 1st Enfield.

In 1985 the Company provided the guard of honour for the unveiling of the Sir William Smith plaque in the St Paul's Cathedral vaults. The BB in Enfield celebrated its centenary in 1988, and in 1990 the 3rd Enfield reached their own 100th anniversary. The Brigade President at the time, Lord Thurso, joined the centennial celebrations in December 1990 at Forty Hall. A special church service was held in front the Brigade President, when new Company colours were presented.

In the 1990s the Company notched up notable cricket and athletic

success. They also returned to form with their bugle band work, winning the London District Drum Team and Solo Bugler titles. In the 21st century, the 3rd Enfield formed a combined bugle band with our friends from the 1st Enfield and won the London District Devonshire Cup in 2006 and 2008, as well as the Novice Band competition in 2014.

The Company in the last ten years has enjoyed a strong and varied programme of events for the boys to take part in, in some cases with our friends at 10th Enfield.

These have included

summer camps, days out to theme parks and zoos, the

Waltham Walk competition,

celebrations to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War, etc. The 3rd Enfield remains a strong BB Company today.

We have had a strong history over the past 135 years and hope for many more years of service to the boys and young men of Enfield. A big thank you to all of the loyal supporters the 3rd Enfield has received over the decades by the friends and leaders.
